Flu vaccine shortage affects Alaska's troops, beneficiaries

As with the rest of the U.S., the Oct. 5 announcement that Chiron Corporation will not be shipping influenza vaccine this year will dramatically impact the anticipated vaccine supply for Alaska military personnel and beneficiaries.

The Department of Defense is finalizing guidelines regarding re-prioritization of recipients given the limited supply of vaccine.

This prioritization will focus on protecting our deployed and deploying troops and our medically high-risk beneficiaries.

The guidelines for determining high-risk beneficiaries will be the same as those published by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention:

- All children ages 6–23 months
- Adults age 65 years and older
- People ages 2–64 years with underlying chronic medical conditions, including chronic disorders of the pulmonary or cardiovascular systems, including asthma; chronic metabolic diseases (including diabetes mellitus), renal dysfunction, blood disorders, or immunosuppression (including immunosuppression caused by medications or by human immunodeficiency virus)
- All women who will be pregnant during the influenza season
- Residents of nursing homes and long-term care facilities
- Children aged 6 months to 18 years on chronic aspirin therapy
- Health-care workers involved in direct patient care
- Out-of-home caregivers and household contacts of children under 6 months.

Army and Air Force medical officials in Alaska are determining their numbers of high-priority personnel and are awaiting service-specific guidance on vaccine distribution procedures, as well as instructions on vaccine sharing, since vaccine may need to be redistributed between installations worldwide to meet the final prioritized need.

In Alaska, just like in the Lower 48, many healthy people who desire a vaccination this year will likely not receive it. Individuals who do not receive a vaccination should be aware of steps to take to avoid contracting the flu.

■ People should avoid close contact with those who are sick.

■ Those who are sick should keep their distance from others to protect them from getting sick, too. If possible, people should stay home when they are sick.

■ People should cover their mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or sneezing — it may prevent others from getting sick.

■ People should wash their hands often and avoid touching their eyes, nose and mouth. Germs are often spread when a person touches something that is contaminated with germs and then touches his or her eyes, nose, or mouth.

As the Department of Defense releases further details, they will be distributed through post or base newspapers, e-mail announcements, staff meetings, commanders' calls and other publicity efforts to keep Alaskan military personnel and beneficiaries abreast of the latest DoD flu vaccination policies.
